Champlain Valley Union High School
Capacity Deliberations

February 5, 2015

The Town of Hinesburg Planning and Zoning office (Alex Weinhagen) has asked for input from the two schools on subject of capacity as a number of new developments take shape in the town. There is a concern that at some point the level of growth will require one of schools to add capital investment for the purposes of increasing capacity, an interesting contrast to the rest of the state.

The Hinesburg Community School convened a meeting of its facility committee, including their architect to reestablish a defensible capacity number for the school. The group discussed State of Vermont guidelines and adjustments necessary for current use of spaces within the building. We also adjusted the result for class size maximums. The result of all that is a capacity number of **670** students, for the current building as used and configured.

The current enrollment at the school is **506** students. The most recent enrollment forecast done by the New England School Development Council (NESDEC) indicates enrollment will continue to grow and cap out at around 560 students in the 20 year horizon. It is important to note that NESDEC's forecasting methodology would include continued growth at the rate the town has seen in the last few years but would miss a dramatic increase in that rate one year to the next.

Alex has provided for the board some analysis of development plans in process and under discussion. Looking closely at the numbers it would appear the background rate of growth evidenced the last few years is in the neighborhood of 13 students per year and the additional growth from new developments would be in the neighborhood of 27 students per year. Allocating the 27 to our two schools, Hinesburg Community School could see an increase of 18 students per year and Champlain Valley Union 9 students per year.

The conclusion for Hinesburg Community School is that proposed development in the town will not exceed school capacity for another 5+/- years. It is recommended this sort of review be repeated every two years as growth unfolds in the town.

The Champlain Valley Union High School convened a meeting with their architect to assess capacity of the school. That review, using a similar process as HCS, established a capacity number of **1410** students. The schools current enrollment is **1290** students. Therefore the school has capacity to absorb anticipated growth for the next 5+ years. The school would also like to revisit the process no less than every two years as growth unfolds in the town.

Bob,

Thanks very much for both documents – section 5.6 (schools) Town Plan update; school capacity and impacts of proposed development.

A few follow ups:

Town Plan (section 5.6):

1. The charts showing actual enrollment over time are very helpful! Thanks for updating those. Do you have projected enrollment charts looking forward 10 years? If a chart isn't available or isn't the preferred way to present this, see next question.
2. The revised text indicates the projected enrollment at HCS in 10 years – i.e., rising to 560. No such projection is provided in the next paragraph for CVU. Do you have a forecast for CVU's projected enrollment in 10 years?

School Capacity & Development Impact:

3. The letter indicates that the capacity of HCS is 670 students, “for the current building as used and configured”. I know portions of the building were “decommissioned” due to previously declining enrollment. Perhaps all of these are back in use? Does the 670 capacity number include full utilization of all portions of the building? It would be good to know if the 670 number is a “hard” cap given the available space and today’s class size and programming considerations, or if instead, 670 is the cap leaving some portions of the building unutilized – i.e., the capacity might be larger with full building utilization.

4. The letter doesn’t specifically address the two development projects (Haystack Crossing and Hinesburg Center Phase 2) that I provided you student generation data on. I gather from the conclusion statements, that based on the projections, these developments at full build out will not create so many students as to exceed the capacity of either HCS or CVU. I had a little trouble parsing the numbers in the letter to do this calculation, so I just want to confirm my reading of the conclusions.
